

Assured admission

WSU assures admission to U.S. high school students who are ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school class or who have an unweighted cumulative high school GPA of 3.5 or higher (on a 4.0 scale). assured.wsu.edu

Running Start & other college-level coursework

If you have completed Running Start classes or any other college-level coursework while in high school, you should apply as a freshman to WSU. You will receive applicable college credit once we receive an official college transcript.

AP, IB, CLEP & AICE credit
