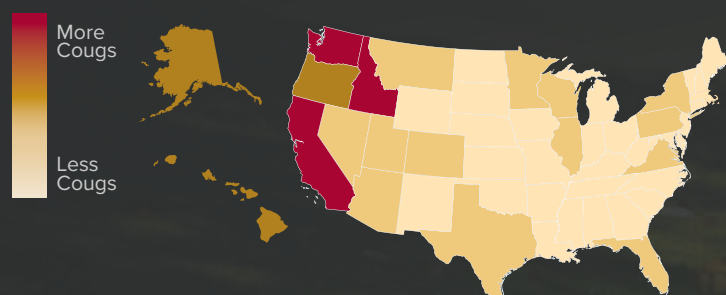

With our non-impacted majors, you can graduate in four years, saving you time and money. Whether it's engineering, pre-med, nursing, communications, or one of our other 200+ academic fields of study, we've got you covered.

**YOU'LL ENJOY A VIBRANT
STUDENT EXPERIENCE**

Whether you're in a fraternity or sorority or living in the residence halls, you'll find a home away from home at WSU. There's also no shortage of things to do. Experience the roar of a packed Martin Stadium football game. Form an intramural team with your new hall mates. Join a club sport like golf, rowing, soccer, etc. Attend a concert in Beasley Coliseum or on the Terrell Mall.

IT'S AFFORDABLE

With the **Western Undergraduate Exchange** or **WUE** (here we call it the **Cougar Award**), an out-of-state student may **receive a \$10,000 award**, renewable for up to four years. That can reduce out-of-state tuition to less than a California student would pay in-state in the University of California system. The cost of living in Pullman is low, and the minimum wage is high—\$11 an hour and increasing to \$11.50 in 2018.

WSU encourages undergraduate research and offers hands-on learning opportunities in every major. Students often complete internships in Pullman or in their home states.

We have small town friendliness and everything you'll need for a meaningful college experience.

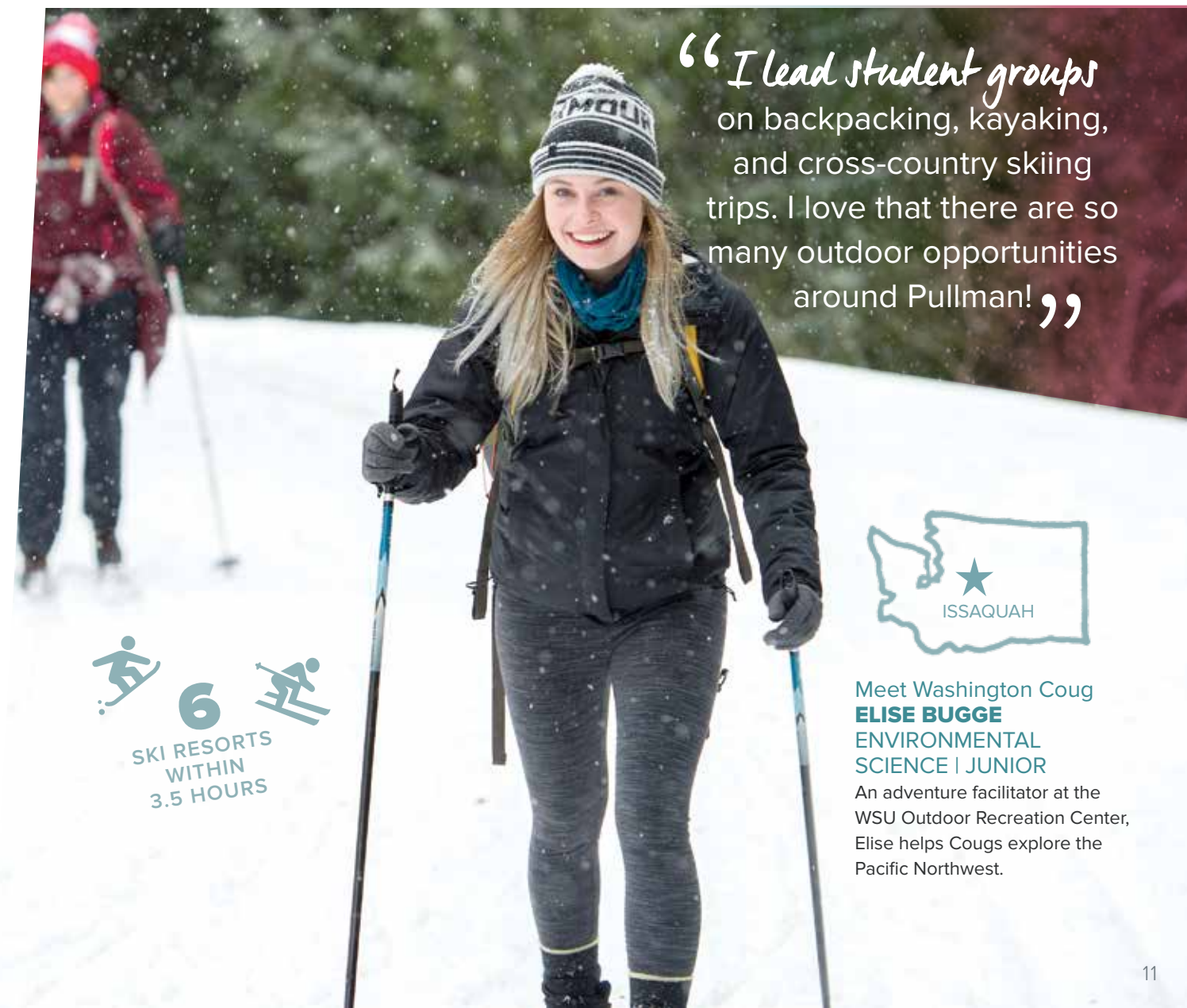

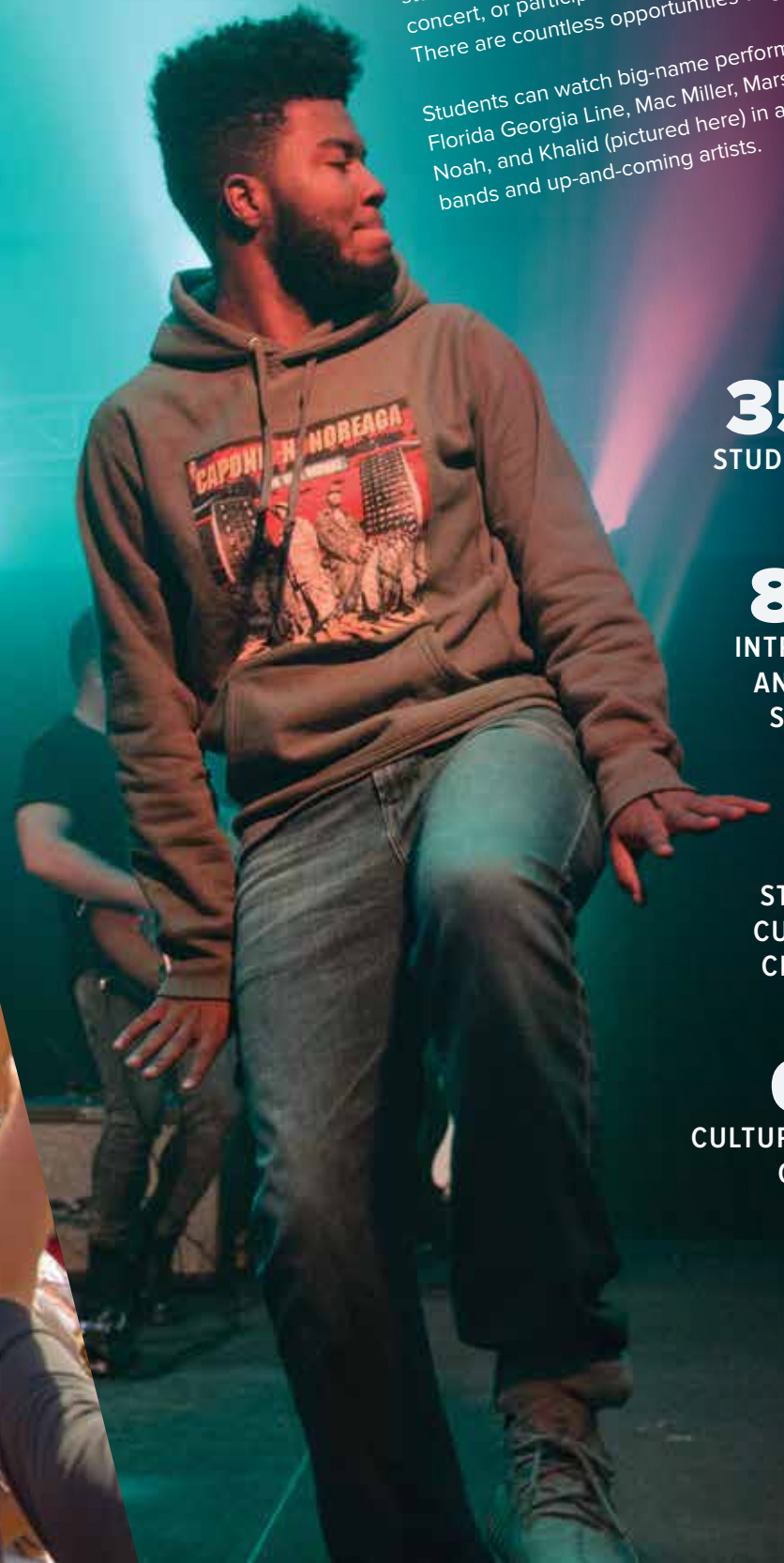

Assured admission

WSU assures admission to U.S. high school students who are ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school class or who have an unweighted cumulative high school GPA of 3.5 (on a 4.0 scale). [assured.wsu.edu](#)

College-level coursework

If you have completed college-level coursework while in high school, you should apply as a freshman to WSU. You will receive applicable college credit once we receive an official college transcript.

Completing the FAFSA and applying for WSU scholarships are vital first steps—but don’t stop there.

Use our scholarship search engine and outside sources to find other awards. We’ll add scholarships from other sources to the financial aid WSU offers you!

- You can earn scholarships for community service, leadership, work experience, life experience, career goals, and more.
- Apply for as many scholarships as you can. We suggest applying for at least 40 scholarships from outside the university.
- Amounts range from a few hundred dollars to several thousand, and you can accept any number of awards. Even a few small awards can make a big difference.

Jobs and work-study

Working while in college is very doable. There are hundreds of student-friendly jobs in the Pullman area, both on campus and off. With the state’s \$11 per hour minimum wage (increasing to \$11.50 per hour in 2018), working 15 hours a week during the school year will earn you more than \$5,500 before taxes! Students in work-study positions can earn a maximum of \$4,000 per year.

It’s worth the investment

On average, a bachelor’s degree brings \$1.6 million more than a high school diploma in lifetime earnings.

And how’s this for value: the average mid-career salary for WSU graduates with a bachelor’s degree is \$89,100, ranked among the top 15% of 4-year universities in the U.S. (*PayScale College Salary Report 2016-17*)

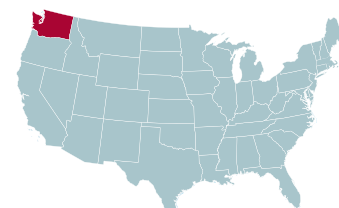
