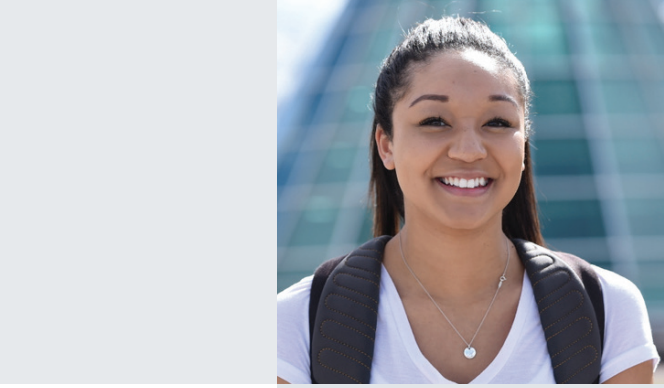

University Achievement Award

\$2,000 and \$4,000 awards, renewable for a second year. Awarded based on a combination of unweighted high school GPA and SAT or ACT test scores. uaacalculator.wsu.edu

Regents Scholars Program

\$4,000 annually, for up to four years or full tuition and fees for four years (Distinguished Regents Award only, if selected). 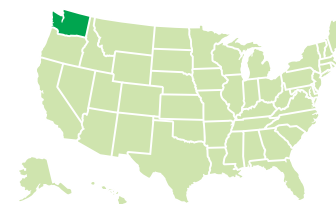
